Today, SCAN is working to mobilize more than **5,000 supporters in Tennessee** to make sure every child in the United States has access to high-quality early learning and that no mother or child around the globe dies from a preventable disease or illness.

Our state-based volunteer leadership network—based in the **Nashville metropolitan area and West Tennessee**—is engaging parents, teachers, medical professionals and local business leaders who are passionate about advocating for kids. Opportunities for All Children in Tennessee

Investing in early childhood education and care is one of the most effective ways to break the cycle of poverty. These investments lay the foundation for success later in school and in life.

The Challenge

The environment and interactions children are exposed to during the first five years of life greatly influence their futures. Unfortunately, these programs are out of reach for many working families across the nation, including in Tennessee, where **more than one third of children under the age of six are from low-income families and nearly 70 percent of 3- and 4-year-olds are not enrolled in preschool or nursery school programs.**

By age 4, children in poverty are as many as 18 months behind in development as other children. By age 5, a child's brain is nearly completely developed, so it's critical to provide early learning opportunities from birth until kindergarten.

The Solution

Two generational high-quality early learning and care programs offer real benefits not only to families, but to the entire country. A December 2016 report from Nobel Prize-winning University of Chicago economist James Heckman shows the rate of return on investments in early childhood development for children in high-quality programs can be 13 percent per child, per year due to improved outcomes in education, health, sociability and reduced crime.



We know that expanding access to high-quality education is the best way to close the growing opportunity gap in our country. That's why SCAN is continuing to work with Republicans, Democrats and coalition partners in Tennessee to expand access to high-quality early childhood education and home visiting programs, including Save the Children's Early Steps to School Success program, which assists babies and young children with language, social and emotional development; equips parents with the skills and knowledge to be the first and best teacher for their child; and develops strong home-school connections. **Save the Children began working with Tennessee communities in 1933 to provide support to school children during the Great Depression and currently partners with 24 schools across nine Tennessee counties to bring programs to more than 10,000 children.**

Helping Children Around the World Survive

Children all around the world deserve to survive until their fifth birthday and beyond. Investing in the health of moms and kids reduces poverty, sparks economic growth, creates more secure nations and, saves lives.

The Challenge

Globally, 5.6 million children under age 5—nearly half of whom are infants—die each year from preventable causes such as pneumonia, malnutrition and malaria. More than 800 mothers die every day from problems related to their pregnancies. In too many cases, moms and kids around the world do not have access to the medical care or supplies they need to survive. This is heart breaking, but the good news is that because of leadership from the United States more moms and kids are surviving—and we can do even better.

The Solution

In the last 20 years, the number of mothers and kids dying from preventable diseases has dropped by half. Simple and inexpensive solutions, like basic medicine, thermometers and clean water, are saving lives. That's why SCAN is building bipartisan support for the Reach Every Mother and Child (Reach) Act, a bipartisan bill in the U.S. House and Senate which would help end the preventable deaths of mothers and children around the world.

Our Successes

With the help of our activist base in Tennessee, we have made great progress in advancing our goals for children in the Volunteer State and around the world.
